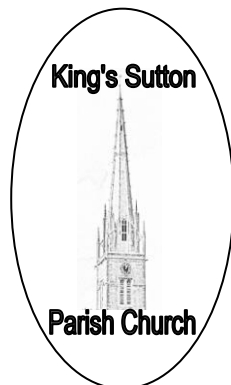

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## YFM

On the churchyard wall is a banner reminding everyone who passes that we are celebrating a Year of Faith and Mission. It continues till the end of November, when we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King.

Many of you who read this are people of faith, although you may not be among those who come regularly to worship. But let me write again about faith.

It is a gift from God but needs the right conditions in which to grow. You may recall Jesus' parable of the Sower. (Mark 4: 1-20) The seed is sown everywhere, on the footpath, among the weeds, in places with little soil but the only seed which grows and flourishes is that which falls on the good soil. So I suppose a key question about faith is whether we are good soil? Put another way, are we people who are open-minded, listening, observant, finding time to reflect and ponder on the great issues that we face as human beings in a complex world?

Faith is a way of interpreting the world. The Bible is full of stories in which people interpreted the things happening around them: they saw in them the activity of God, and perhaps, naively, they speak of God as if he were another character in human history. The modern age is so used to seeing everything

“as if God did not exist” that it finds it hard to interpret events in the light of God.

Faith is rooted for me in Jesus. In him, in his teaching and activities, but above all in his death and resurrection, I see God at work. When we look at Jesus we see God. And from that, it seems to me, follows an experience of seeing the whole of life as the activity of God. But faith does not expect to be able to prove God – his existence or his activity – because God by his very nature cannot be observed, measured, recorded in the way that the world can be. Faith says there is much more than I can see, and when I look at the world with the eyes of faith I see not only beauty and truth and love, but a vision of how life might be if we followed the way of Jesus.

There is always an open invitation to be part of the Church here. Come and join us and bring your faith alive in worship.

## **SAINTS' DAYS**

In September there is a plethora of saints' days and festivals – Gregory the Great (3<sup>rd</sup>), the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary (8<sup>th</sup>), John Chrysostom (13<sup>th</sup>), Holy Cross Day (14<sup>th</sup>), Cyprian (15<sup>th</sup>), Ninian (16<sup>th</sup>), Edward Pusey (16<sup>th</sup>), Hildegard of Bingen (17<sup>th</sup>), Matthew (21<sup>st</sup>) and Michael and All Angels (29<sup>th</sup>). There are many more that could be on this list!

**Michael, Gabriel and Raphael** are the three named Biblical angels, depicted as the beloved messengers of God. Michael, (meaning 'Who is like God?'), is perhaps best known as the slayer of the dragon in the book of Revelation. Michael has thus come to be regarded as the protector of Christians from the devil, particularly those at the hour of death. Gabriel, ('The Strength of God') is the one, according to the Gospel of Luke, who is sent by God to Mary to announce the birth of Christ. Raphael, ('The Healing of God'), is depicted in the book of Tobit (in the Apocrypha) as the one who restores sight to Tobit's eyes. A basilica near Rome was dedicated in the fifth century in honour of Michael on 30<sup>th</sup> September, with celebrations beginning on the eve of that day, with the result that 29<sup>th</sup> September came to be observed as a feast in honour of Michael and all Angels throughout the Western Church.

This year, the 29<sup>th</sup> falls on a Sunday, and to mark the occasion, Evensong at 6pm will be more fully choral than normal, using a setting of the canticles by Stanford in Bb.

An ancient celtic poem in praise of Michael the Archangel:

THOU Michael the victorious,  
I make my circuit under thy shield,  
Thou Michael of the white steed,  
And of the bright brilliant blades,  
Conqueror of the dragon,  
Be thou at my back,  
Thou ranger of the heavens,  
Thou warrior of the King of all,  
O Michael the victorious,  
My pride and my guide,  
O Michael the victorious,  
The glory of mine eye.

I make my circuit  
In the fellowship of my saint,  
On the machair, on the meadow,  
On the cold heathery hill;  
Though I should travel ocean  
And the hard globe of the world  
No harm can e'er befall me  
'Neath the shelter of thy shield;  
O Michael the victorious,  
Jewel of my heart,  
O Michael the victorious,  
God's shepherd thou art.

Be the sacred Three of Glory  
Aye at peace with me,  
With my horses, with my cattle,  
With my woolly sheep in flocks.  
With the crops growing in the field  
Or ripening in the sheaf,  
On the machair, on the moor,  
In cole, in heap, or stack.  
Every thing on high or low,  
Every furnishing and flock,  
Belong to the holy Triune of glory,  
And to Michael the victorious.
