The Font, which has associations with St. Rumbold AD 662


Lectern

Displays associated with the Church's life.



The Font, which was discovered buried in the churchyard.

It is also a place of history, being the oldest building in the village.

It is in continuous use

It has monuments and grave stones.

The Church is also a work of art containing many artefacts:

Stone with arches, carved capitals etc.



The seating and arches in the chancel inside and the small carvings under the eaves outside – 12th century.

There are tiled floors, fabrics, kneelers.





There are several stained glass windows dating from the second half of the 19th century. They illustrate the life of Jesus and some of his teachings.

The church has an organ and a piano.
The latter made by Broadwood in 1873.



The tower and spire are its most outstanding feature: almost 200 feet tall and visible for miles around.

The Church is a resource for teaching:

- About the Christian faith
- About village history
- About stained glass, carved wood, fabrics, metals
- About bells and organ
- About architecture
- Maths, music, story, history, the environment, calligraphy

The church is always open but often there are events, so please check that the place will be available when you want to come.

It is also helpful to have someone there to switch on the lights.
